2003 NACSA Mini-Conference

We look forward to seeing you at our annual NACSA meeting in Atlanta on August 15, 2003, prior to the ASA meeting. Highlight of the program is a special session on “Social Capital in the Chinese Context” to discuss Nan Lin’s *Social Capital* by panelists Min Zhou, Chieh-Hsuan Chen, and Yanjie Bian. She delivered the first comprehensive course in sociology of education in China in 1984; and in 1989 she was nominated an honorary member of China's Sociology of Education Research Society. Election as a fellow of the Royal Society is the highest accolade available to scientists and scholars in Canada. The Royal Society of Canada consists of about 1600 members across the country. The Society is devoted to the promotion of learning and research in the natural and social sciences and in the humanities.
